SECURITY ALERT

At the Club's May Luncheon - the first of Keith McArthur's Chairmanship - the featured speaker was 'one of our own', namely **Bruce Dawson-Moray,** taking as his theme **Security - Our Future.** Drawing on his extensive career experience in **military intelligence security** (in the course of which he crossed paths with fellow-Probian, Jonathan Rollason) Bruce gave a comprehensive and sobering review of today's ever-growing variety of security threats. He identified the major dangers as cyber threat, espionage, terrorism and organised crime and listed a number of agencies devoted to keeping us safe, the best-known probably being MI5, MI6 and GCHQ. At all costs, we ourselves should avoid



complacency and make awareness and alertness our watchwords. Particularly, given our increasing dependence on IT and the Web, lax security can *nationally* leave open to harm almost every aspect of our infrastructure; *corporately* do serious damage to companies' share prices and reputations, while *individually* making us highly vulnerable to the wiles of fraudsters and scamsters. Bruce went on to highlight various ways in which security can be tightened and those on the 'dark web', hackers and other ill intentioned tricksters can be kept at bay. He volunteered to post some helpful material on the Club's website, an offer immediately accepted by Webmaster Keith Willcocks.

After a lively question time, Nick Waters proposed a vote of thanks drawing attention to the authority and relevance of Bruce's presentation. Members went their ways with plenty to bear in mind, taking into account unremitting vigilance as the keynote.
