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Fighting fraud: Probus meets the SCAMBUSTERS!

Calculated to strike fear into the heart of any fraudster... the formidable alliance of recently retired **Teddington-based Met Sergeant, Les Jackson** and **Nat West Community Banker, Sally Schofield**, operating across the West London area. Welcomed by Chairman Chris Pollard as our guest speakers at the Club's November Luncheon, Les and Sally delivered a searching – and sobering – analysis of the manifold cunning means employed by the scamsters to rob us of our money and, in some cases, our identities. Les warned us forcefully that the perpetrators are COMPLETELY INDIFFERENT in regard to your age and circumstances and into any immediate and longer-term damage they may do you. Their livelihood depends on parting you from your money, in pursuit of which they are persistent, ingenious, well-coordinated and absolutely ruthless. He went on to play chilling video clips of three of the most prevalent scams, showing how ATMs, emails, texts, phone calls and social media can all figure in the con-artists' web of deceit. Sally then expatiated on her own specific skills set for preventing and nullifying banking fraud. She reiterated that strict vigilance should be observed when replying to 'dodgy' emails, visiting unsecure websites and responding to cold telephone calls. The guiding principle should always be to divulge as little as possible about yourself and your finances, particularly as members' demographics place us high on the villains' 'hit list'. It was also of prime importance immediately to report any actual or suspected scams and to use every possible safeguard for computer security. Following a barrage of questions, Bruce Dawson – Moray's proposal of the vote of thanks paid tribute to the professionalism and relevance of the presentation. It only remained for members to see and sample some of the useful literature and safety devices on display.
