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WALK FROM THE ABINGER HATCH, ABINGER COMMON, 4th JULY 2023



The first challenge of this walk was getting to the starting point at the Abinger Hatch pub. It was a day when the traffic around the Hampton area and beyond seemed to be gridlocked by vehicles courtesy of the Flower Show. Eventually eleven people had managed to make it to the Hatch, but the delays meant that the walk didn't start until nearly 11a.m., an hour later than scheduled.

The intrepid eleven walkers and one dog set off under threatening skies, expecting to return for a late lunch due to the delayed start. It started off well enough, with good progress being made over easy ground on a footpath through some woods. The next stretch was along a country lane past some interesting old cottages, probably tied to the Wotton estate. The sky grew darker as we reached the point where we were due to turn down a forest track. There was a sign on the gate saying that the footpath was closed, and a JCB was standing a little way ahead.

Mike Fraser, a man with authority (being a former policeman), went to investigate and found a workman who told him it was too dangerous to use the path. To continue our walk the only alternative route was to find our way along roads, including the busy A25. It had started to rain a bit by now, and the collective decision was to retrace our steps back to the Hatch rather than just trudge along the roadside.

So for possibly the first time the walking party reached the lunch venue before any of the driving diners. The walkers had a look in the local church to kill some time before crossing over to the pub. They were joined by seven other arrivals and a convivial lunch was enjoyed.

LUNCH TALK ON "FOOD, DRINK AND DINING HISTORY" by MARC MELTONVILLE

Our June lunch talk was a treat for fellow members with an interest shared by many, in beer and beer making, and specifically, by our speaker, in Tudor times. It was our good fortune to have some light shed on this rather arcane topic by a real expert; Marc Meltonville is a noted food historian, whose research into the history and the creation of early breweries both in this country and the USA has led to the unearthing of many ancient and previously lost documents and recipes. Interpreting their special language, he has been involved in the recreation of old breweries, often in castles (Petworth, Portsmouth, Keys at Cambridge, and our neighbouring



Hampton Court Palace, with its Rose, Red Lion, White Hart and Dragon, and in Pennsylvania in the USA): the focus on castles appears to have been driven by the importance of beer as an energy source for isolated troops.

Marc introduced us to a number of early terms and their derivations, and he led us through a real brewery project, using these skills to recreate a genuine Tudor experience: the result was a satisfying brew which would have been acceptable to the members, but, sadly, no samples.

Sixty-five members, wives and guests attended our annual BBQ at Tamesis Sailing Club. The weather was kind for us and warm but not too hot.
