### LUNCH TALK ON "THE COFFEE HOUSE REVOLUTION" by HELEN NAYLOR

Dr Helen Naylor is a City of Westminster blue badge guide. Helen gave us a comprehensive review of the boom in London's coffee houses during the Age of Enlightenment.

Whilst the taverns provided gin, the chance of a fist fight and other low pleasures, the coffee houses offered sober conversation and discourse with one's peers for the price of a coffee at 1d. That's worth close to £2 today.

Coffee beans were supplied into London by the Levant Company. The first London coffee house was opened on Cornhill in 1652 and managed by Pasqua Rosee. Restoration London had a rapid commercial expansion and saw the coffee houses boom in number. Coffee houses were meeting points and centres for information exchange: they later became the progenitors of key organisations such the London Stock Exchange, Lloyds of London, Royal Society for the Arts and even the RSPCA.

Helen could only speculate as to how the coffee tasted and whether it was sugared to cut the bitterness. Did that aspect of the coffee trade add to the expansion of the slave trade?

John Murray gave the vote of thanks to Helen and members showed their strong appreciation in the usual way.
