## LUNCH TALK ON "LIFE BEHIND THE SCENES AT BBC TELEVISION CENTRE", by JENNY MALLIN



Jenny Mallins is best known as the winner of the "Best in the World Cookbook 2017" but for ten years s in her early career she was a junior member of the BBC's production team, literally living life behind the scenes at the Beeb.

Jenny outlined the launch and development of the BBC's television service. Starting in 1935 in the Alexandra Palace dining room, it was the 1953 Coronation that kickstarted sales of TV sets and wider public interest. The TV service moved out to Lime Grove in 1949 and then by 1960 to the custom-built BBC TV Centre. This was designed by Graham Dawbarn. It was on the site of the Franco-British exhibition of 1908. The buildings appear as a form of question mark, with broadcast studios and support departments tightly wound together. Jenny highlighted the massive scale of the Props Department and Wardrobe's diligence in costume design. On-site facilities included the BBC club and restaurant. The BBC also used the theatre on Shepherd's Bush Green for variety shows such as Billy Cotton's Bandshow and The Generation Game.

Jenny's work focussed on drama scripts, working for the production team most notably with Alan Bennett. She also worked on John Craven's Newsround.

The TV centre is now a residential development with only a small residual TV production facility. Bill Rawcliffe, one of our ex-TV professionals, gave the vote of thanks.
